Notes:

Mr. Jamison, no doubt, was a native of Pennsylvania. His parentage is unknown. With the sheer number of Jamesons residing throughout this mid-central region, making the connection is almost impossible. Yet,

despite this difficulty, John may have been related to one of three distinct Jamison branches in the area. The Jamisons of Lancaster county, Bucks county, and of York county are all prolific and viable possibilities.

Mr. Jamison made his will on March 17, 1774, probated March 26 just nine days later. His executors were James **Brown** and John **Espy**. In toto his will follows:

"In the Name of God Amen March 17, 1774 I John Jamison of West Pennsborough *(1) Township Cumberland County and Province of Pennsylvania being weak in Body bot of perfect ming(sic) and Memory and calling to mind the Mortality of my Body that it is apointed for all Men once to Die I do therefore amke and Ordain this to be my last Will and Testament and in the first Place I give & Bequeath my soul to God and my Body tot he Earth to be Buried in a Christian manner at the Discreation of my Executor herein after mentioned not doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same by the mighty Power of God and as pitching my Worldly Estate wherwith it has pleased God to Bless me I will and apoint that all be sold, boath Real and Personal Except _____ and ____ cloaths which I will and Bequeath to my Beloved wife Mary as likewise the disposal of all my Books and Body cloaths amongst my children. Likewise I Will and apoint that my Funeral charges and all my Just Debts be payed. Item I give and bequeath to my loving wife fifteen Pounds and one cow if so much ram cans after all Debts is payed. Also I give & bequeath to my son, John, all my copper tools I will and apoint that my Children viz George, David, Samuel, Rachel be bound out till they come of Age at the Discretion of my Executor and likewise Isac as soon as posible. Item I give & bequeath to my son William five shillings sterling and if there be any Remander after the above legacys I will and ordain that it be equally divided among the above named viz George David Samuel Rachel and Isaac and I do hearby nominate Constitute and appoint my trusty and well beloved friend viz James **Brown** and John Espy to be my Executors of this my last Will and Testament and I do hearby revoke disanul Disallow or make void all other Wills Testaments and Bequeathments and executors hear to fore made or done in any manner by me and this only to be my last Will and Testament In Testimony hear of I have hearunto Set my Name and Seal the Day and Year above writen.

- John Jamison II removed to Conemaugh, Indiana co., PA. On March 18, 1805 he deeded to Alexander Sharp, his brother-in-law, of Newville, Cumberland co., PA., four plantations in New Town consisting of 584 acres and 10 poles, part of the land patented to him originally. Mr. Jamison married 1783, Cumberland co., PA., Rebecca **Rankin**, born June 12, 1763, PA., died July 6, 1842, Lebanon, Warren co., OH., the daughter of

Thomas and Isabelle (Clendennin) Rankin. They resided in Warren co., OH.

Notes:

Mr. Jamison left Cumberland county shortly after his 21st birthday and settled into Elizabeth township Allegheny co., PA. *(2). On February 17, 1789, George Jeamison of Westmoreland co. sold to Thomas Rankin of Washington co., PA. one mare, branded with "RR", one cow, two steer, one heffer, one calf, sow and five suckling pigs, two sheep, two beds, bedding, household goods, all grain now sown for 40 pounds. Signed by George Jameson and witnessed by Robert **Bowers** and John Rankin. In the vicinity of Elizabeth were George Jameson, Robert <u>Jameson</u>, and William Rankin. Robert Jameson's son, John Jamison, b. 1798, married Eliza Rankin and they had the following children: John R. Jamison, George R. Jamison, James R. Jamison, David R. Jamison, Andrew R. Jamison, Thomas R. Jamison, Robert R. Jamison, and a daughter, name unknown. All the R's listed in the above Jamisons stood for Rankin. By 1793, George Jamison et al were residing in Washington co., PA. In Washington co., PA. were two David Jamisons, one of whom was from Delaware (#20000) and the other who may have been George Jamison's brother.

George Jamison enlisted into the military. He may have participated in the American Revolution War, though no records after 1776 have disclosed this. By 1794, Jamison was under the command of General Anthony Wayne, participating in the military actions from that time until the settlement of the Ohio boundaries in 1795. This was the Old Northwest, a battleground for expansionism, European superiority, and the liguidation of the American native tribesmen. It encompassed an area lying north of the Ohio River, east of the Mississippi, south of the Great Lakes, and west of Pennsylvania. Comprised of the states of Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, and a part of Minnesota it covered 265,878 square miles. With the French, the Indian, the British, and the American colonists all after this vast, lush forested and fertile valley clashes among the four couldn't be helped. It would eventually take persistence, tremendous politics, and the use of arms to wrest the region from it various owners. The Army of the Northwest developed right after the defeat of the British in 1783. A series of forts were built west along the Ohio and with the enactment of the Northwest ordinance in 1787, settlers began to pour into the valley. Trouble immediately erupted between them and the Indians. During this time General Josiah **Harmar** led the early campaigns to stem the native American resistance against the early settlers. By 1790 Northwest Governor St. Clair authorized Pennsylvania and Kentucky to send up to 1500 militiamen to Fort Washington(Cincinatti). After struggling several weeks through the dense wilderness, Harmar finally emerged near the site of present day Fort Wayne, Inidana where the principal Miami Indian village stood. Primarily undisciplined and untrained Harmar sent out groups of 200 to 500 men at a time. Unrestrained, the militiamen scattered throughout the area looking

for Indians and plunder, only to return after suffering heavy casualties when fighting erupted between them and the Miamis. In defeat, the General returned to Fort Washington.

In the following year Congress authorized a second infantry regiment added to the regular troops, commissioning St. Clair as a Major General to lead them. With 2000 men behind him, two-thirds of whom were levies(enlisted for the cause), the Governor advanced nearly 100 miles into the Ohio Valley to the headwaters of the Wabash River in present day Mercer co., OH. Taking measures opposite those of Harmar, until the morning of November 3rd, St. Clair had no idea what the Indian situation was like. On that early morning a thousand wildly yelling Miamis fell upon the unsuspecting camp, driving them into a panic, and scattering the force who fought and fled in disorder back to Cincinatti. Six hundred and thirty-seven men died and 263 were wounded outraging the nation and spurring Congress to action by immediately doubling the size of the militia.

In 1792 Major General Anthony **Wayne** was appointed head of the legion stationed at Fort Pitt(Pittsburgh). Fortifying his careful plans of defense he rigorously drilled his men, disciplined his officers, and kept morale high with plentiful supplies. In the background, the British maintained a constant intrique going while waiting to see what the Americans would do. But as the year drew to a close, the foundations for the conquest of the Miamis and the defeat of British designs in the region were firmly being laid.

During the spring of 1793, Wayne moved his army to Fort Washington and in the ensuing summer fortified the forts and garrisons to the north. At this time a peace commission was sent from Philadelphia to treat with the hostile tribes and the General was ordered not to make any overt actions that might be misconstrued as aggression. As the summer waned, the commissioners failed to conslude any meaningful rapport and the advantage of a campaign that year grew slim. By winter Wayne garrisoned his men at Fort Greenville(Darke co., OH), and began construction of Fort Recovery in the final week of the year.

In January of 1794 representatives from the Miamis came to Fort Recovery professing friendship and a desire for peace. A truce sprang from the meeting on the condition that the Indian confederacy release all white prisoners and bring to an end all hostilities. For two months the wilderness remained quiet though no captives were ever brought to Fort Greenville. It was probably at this time that George Jameson arrived in camp *(3). He assisted the General in the administration of the militia on the frontier and in the plans for offensive strategy. That George Jameson was an officer appears to be the case for his tasks tended toward leadership, planning, and strategy. By March scattered incidences of violence occurred alarmingly throughout the northwest frontier, and Wayne, slowly realized that the struggle would continue. While he renewed his preparations, a small British force on the banks of the Maumee River began construction of a strong fort (Fort Miami) that commanded both the waterway and land approaches to Detroit. Not unaware of this, Wayne protested against the building of the post and of the Canadian Governor-General's inflammatory speech in February. Calling up an additional 1500 Kentuckian volunteers Wayne augmented his supply base more quickly and by the strat of summer all was in readiness.

On the very last day in June some 2000 Miamis laid seige to Fort Recovery. During the day, through the night, and into the following morning that the attack had progressed the walls of the fort remained intact. The defense by the fort's militiamen had such an effect upon the Indians that a month later the chiefs of the Confederacy were at first disposed to accept Wayne's offer of peace. Reinforced with more militia, Wayne continued north with a contingent of over 3000 troops. The legion plodded on building way stations as they advanced: Fort Adams on St. Mary's, Fort Defiance at the confluence of the Maumee and Auglaise, and Fort Deposit on the north side of the Maumee River.

Approaching within a few miles of Fort Miami(now Toledo, OH), there, on August 20th, nearly within sight of the British guns, the Miamis attacked. The American infantry held their ground. Before the Indians could come at them again, the troops charged furiously at the enemy driving them out from under the cover of the

fallen trees. At the Battle of Fallen Trees acted out in Defiance co., OH. the trees and stumps had recently been uprooted by a tornado which lent an eerie landscape to the battle in progress. In the plains the Miamis fell victim to Wayne's mounted volunteers. The British had closed the gates to their allies and the rout was completed in little over an hour. Ignoring British protests, Wayne remained for a few more days destroying the tribe's villages and burning their crops. On returning to Fort Washington, Wayne came to the headwaters of the Mauree and constructed Fort Wayne, the site of General Harmar's defeat.

August 3, 1795 loomed and the Treaty of Greenville was concluded with the Indian Confederacy-the Miamis, Pottawatomies, and the Wyandots. The British-Indian hold on the northwest was broken and the region was now firmly in the hands of Washington. George Jameson, in his capacity as a strategist, no doubt lent a thought or two in drafting the treaty as he was also a vital part in the formation of the Ohio boundaries at the Indian village of Chillicothe.

During the summer of 1795, George Jameson's wife, Rebecca, their children, and two other families left Fort Pitt in a flat-bottomed boat on the Ohio and met her husband in Cincinatti some time in August. Six months laters George and Rebecca and their family removed to Turtle Creek, Warren co., OH where they died in 1834 and 1842, respectively.

Thomas Rankin was the great-grandson of (a) Alexander Rankin who was born around 1630 in Scotland. In 1688, taking his family to Londonderry, Londonderry co., Ireland, Mr. Rankin was suddenly and violently immersed into the religious battles of Ulster. He fought at the 1689 infamous Seige of Londonderry *(4) probably along side that of William Jameson who was there also. Alexander Rankin had three sons, one of whom, (b) William, is known. William Rankin(b) was born about 1660 in Scotland and removed to Ireland in 1688 with his father and two other brothers. He married and had three sons of his own: (c)Adam Rankin(born c. 1688, Scotland, d. 1747, Ky?; m. Mary Steele, & had James Rankin, William Rankin, & Jeremiah Rankin(m. 1754, Rachel Craig & had issue Adam Rankin(b. 1755, d.1827), & two other sons), (d) John Rankin, and (e) Hugh Rankin (resided in Nutfield, NH., and had nine daughters-Mrs. Hugh **Stirling** of Maine, Mrs. William Gregg, Mrs. John Gregg, Mrs. Allen Anderson, Mrs. James Cochran, Mrs. Clyde Mrs.(Jean) John Crombie, a daughter who died young, and Mrs. Rogers of Maine. John Rankin(d) was born 1690, Londonderry, Ireland and died 1749/50, either in Nutfield, NH or Cumberland co., PA. Mr. Rankin married first Jane McElwee, and second Margaret _____. They had the following children: (f) Thomas Rankin, (g) Elizabeth Rankin, (h) Ann Rankin, (i) Margaret Rankin, (j) Catherine Rankin, (k) Rebecca Rankin, (1) Agnes Rankin, and (m) Richard Rankin, d. 1792, who married Agnes Douglas. Thomas Rankin(f) was born 1724, Ulster, Ireland, and died 1810, Greene co., TN. He married about 1754, Isabella Clendenin, daughter of John and Janet (**Huston**) Clendenin of Nutfield, NH *(5). His children were: (n) John Rankin, b. 1754, d. 1825, m. Jennie Waugh, (o) Richard Rankin, b. 1756, d. 1827, m. Mr. Thomas Rankin, his brother, Richard Rankin, and his brother-in-law, John Clendenin, left Londonderry, NH. about some time prior to 1750 where they show up in East Pennsboro, Cumberland co., PA. In 1762 or some time just before this date Richard and Thomas Rankin removed to Allen township in Cumberland County. In 1767 Thomas Rankin entered 120 acres in Allen twp. and was there as late as 1771. By 1775 Thomas Rankin and his family were residing in Fermanaugh, Cumberland county. It was during this time that Thomas and his four sons, John, Richard, Samuel, and William Rankin all served during the Revolutionary War. In 1780, Thomas Rankin and his family removed to Augustus co., VA. They didn't stay long and in 1784 they moved south to Jefferson co., TN settling close to the French Broad River.

24524-2 ISAAC JAMISON [John], was born about 1769, probably Cumberland co., PA., the son of John and Mary Jamison (24500). He died 1802 in Alexandria, Egypt during the Battle of Alexandria fought between Napolean and British forces there.

Notes:

Mr. Jamison remained in Cumberland co., PA. until 1800 where inspired and attracted to the cause of Napolean, Isaac Jamison rounded up some 100 men of like mind, his politics were such, that he took them to France where they all enlisted into the French Foreign Service. He became a Captain under one of Napoleans Regiments. Sent to Africa under Bonaparte's campaign, he fought against the Egypian, British-aided force at Alexandria where he was killed in 1802, and Bonaparte was expelled sent home in defeat.

Mr. Jamison removed to Ohio in 1795 with his parents. When he was of age he settled into Xenia, Greene co., OH. Raised a Presbyterian he belonged to a splinder froup called the Seeders. In an indenture dated July 17, 1819 with Levi H. **Duffy** of Frederick co., VA. Mr. Jamison purchased 79 acres for \$229.00 in a military survey #4371. Of this he sold 18 acres for \$144.00 August 2, 1819 to Daniel **Murphy**. Mr. Jamison was in the War of 1812.
