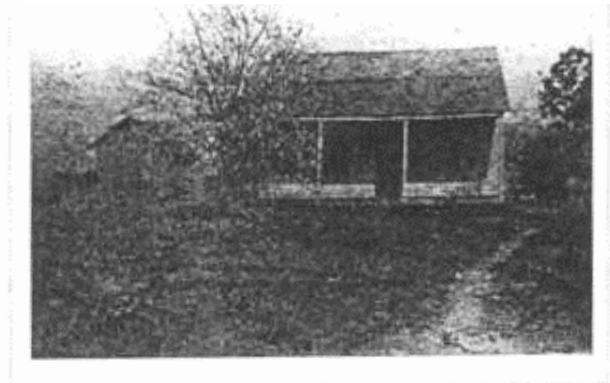

# County Antrim

## Derrykeighan, Millrow Presb Church, Templepatrick,

DERRYKEIGHAN, Consisting of 161 acres the hamlet is also considered a civil parish and a townland in County Antrim about four miles north of Ballymoney in the Barony of Lower Dunluce<sup>1</sup> and as a civil parish contains 37<sup>2</sup> townlands. It gets its name from Doire Chaochain, meaning Caochan's oak-wood.

#152, *The Parish of Derrykeighan*, In the list of Presbyterian landholders proposed to be removed from Ulster to Munster and Leinster in 1623, we find the names of the following Derrykeighan men ; viz , Walter Kennedy, Thomas Boyd, Archibald Boyd, John Peoples, Adam Boyd, and Robert Stewart, with possibly a few others.

The next prebend was Lemuel Mathews, who was non-resident, and suspended by the commission of bishops in 1694. Different curates were in Derrykeighan during his prebendate. The Rev. H. McNeill mentions Dugald Jamison, John McQuern, and Archibald McNeile. Of Jamison and McQuern I know nothing; but McNeile was grandson of a former rector of Billy; viz., Donald McNeile, who was also Cromwellian minister of Ballycastle. Archibald McNeile was promoted to the rectory of Billy, where he died in 1718.

TEMPLEPATRICK, a parish, partly in the barony of Lower, but chiefly in that of Upper, Belfast, county of Antrim, and province of Ulster, 4 miles east of Antrim townland, on the road from Belfast to Londonderry. This place is said to have derived its name from a preceptory of Knights Templars established here at a very early period, but of its foundation or its history nothing is recorded. The parish, in form is nearly triangular, comprising also within its limits the ancient parishes of Carn Graney or Grame, Ballyrobert, and Umgall, was granted, in the reign of Jas. I., to Sir Arthur Chichester, and afterwards regranted to Roger Norton. At the hamlet of *Dunadry*, or *Dunetherg*, "the Middle Fortress," one mile from Templepatrick, a sharp action took place in 1648 between the English and Scotch forces, in which the celebrated Owen O'Conolly, who commanded the former, was mortally wounded. The parish comprises, according to the Ordnance survey,

13,261½ statute acres, a considerable portion of which is mountain land, though affording good pasturage for sheep; there is but a small tract of bog, scarcely yielding sufficient fuel for the use of the inhabitants. The system of agriculture is beginning to improve under the auspices of Lord Templetown, the proprietor, who has subdivided the larger townlands, increased the size of the farms, drained and brought into cultivation great quantities of waste land, laid out the whole valley from the castle to the Six-mile-water as lawn and pasture ground, upon which large numbers of cattle are fed, planted a great number of trees and whitethorn hedges, and made many other improvements. Near the village is the venerable mansion of Castle Upton, formerly called Norton Castle, after Sir Robert Norton, by whom it was founded in the reign of Elizabeth, and now the seat of Viscount Templetown: it occupies the site of the ancient preceptory and is in the castellated style of architecture; it is at present, being restored from the partial dilapidations it had suffered from time to time. The weaving of linen and calico, and the making of hosiery are carried on in several of the farmhouses; and in and near the village are extensive lime works, supplied with limestone raised on the spot; there are also numerous quarries of basaltic stone, which is obtained in abundance. Though there are no fairs in the parish, two of the largest in the county are held on its borders, one at Park Gate, a mile to the north, and the other at Oldstone, two miles to the west. This parish appears to have been one of the earliest Presbyterian settlements in Ireland; on the introduction of a Scottish colony into Ulster, Josias Welsh, grandson of the Scottish reformer, John Knox, is said to have obtained possession of the church, from which he was ejected in 1631 by the bishop of Down and Connor, for nonconformity; he was, however, reinstated by Archbishop Ussher, and died in 1634.

The *living* is a vicarage, in the diocese of Connor, and in the patronage of the Marquess of Donegal, in whom the rectory is impropriate: the tithes amount to £365, of which £70 is payable to the impropriator, and the remainder to the vicar. There was no church from the time of the Reformation till the year 1827, when the present church, a small edifice with a tower at the west end, was erected on an elevated site, at an expense of £830 British, a gift from the late Board of First Fruits. There are three places of worship for Presbyterians, one in connection with the Synod of Ulster, of the third class, one with the Remonstrant Synod, of the second class, and one with the Seceding Synod. There are four national schools, situated at Lyle Hill, Ballypaliday, Ballintoag, and Molusk; and a school at Carn Graney, founded in 1811 by the trustees of Erasmus Smith's charity, and partly supported by them and partly by the Hon. Col. Pakenham, in which five schools are about 230 children; and five private schools, in which about 190 children are taught. Of the ancient preceptory nothing remains except what is included within the walls of Castle Upton (the crypt under which is in a perfect state, and the finely-groined roof in good preservation), and the cemetery of the ancient temple church, in which are the tomb of the Rev. Josias Welsh, and the mausoleum of the Templetown family. In a field at a short distance from the mail road to Antrim is *Cairn Graine*, a remarkably fine monument of antiquity: it consists of ten large tabular stones, supported on upright pillars in the manner of a cromlech, but ranged in a straight line of 41 feet in length in a direction from north-east to south-west; the stone at the north-eastern extremity is rather low, and every succeeding one increases in elevation towards the southwestern extremity, where the tabular stone is of very large dimensions and supported on five upright pillars. Various conjectures have been entertained as to the origin of this interesting relic; the name literally implies "the Heap of the Sun." Not far from this heap is one of the mounds or forts so frequently found in this country; it appears to have been very extensive and of great elevation, but has been much diminished and disfigured by the removal of the sand, of which, intermixed with common field stones, it was originally formed. Near Dunadry is a very perfect circle of large stones, and there are several other raths in the parish. This place gives the titles of Viscount and Baron Templetown to the Upton family.

[MILLROW](#)<sup>3</sup>, The First Presbyterian Church also known as Millrow Presbyterian Church began as early as 1726 according to most records. Ninety families established the Congregation under the jurisdiction of the Templepatrick Presbytery and suitable land was provided and leased to the congregants by the Earl of Massereene<sup>4</sup> whose castle was constructed there between 1613 to 1662 and more commonly known today as Antrim Castle erected along the banks of Sixmilewater River which sits on the northeast of Lough Neagh just a mile north of the town of Antrim<sup>5</sup>.

MAGHERADROOL, a civil parish with 18 townlands one of which is Magheradrool that consists of 503 acres<sup>6</sup> in the Barony of Lower-Iveagh & Kinelearty<sup>7</sup> situated southeast of Ballynahinch and known for its linen and muslin. The Presbyterians, Catholics and Seceding Synod all call it home.

**Caheney River** . Sampson gives J. Chambers, Culterammer, as a bleach green in 1782. This should be Cullyramer. A Morrison family note says: "Agnes married Robert [Jameson](#) (Brookfield) then a bleach green,

Chambers owned it lived in Gettistown." In the Griffith valuation John Adams has a corn mill and flax mill in Boghilboy, next to Cullyramer.

**BOVEEDY**, Boveedy District...was once covered with forest, which provided splendid cover for the native Irish in the constant warfare of Queen Elizabeth's days. In fact, in official correspondence it was called the "strongest fastness" in all the country, harbouring the Neales, the Haggans, the Mulhallans, the MacCahirs, the Quins, and other dependents of the great O'Neils(fn1, Part IV, Chp. I, Pioneering Dayspg. 51).

In the beginning of the Ulster Plantation it was decided to include the Barony of Loughinsholin in which a subdivision for Mercer's Company included most of Kilrea, Tamlaght O'Crilly and "a small part" of Desertoghill parishes(fn-ibid). This consequently became the Presbyterian district of Boveedy. Because of the London trades companies a number of English were transported over early on though large numbers of Scots were enticed to come over prior to the 1641 Rebellion when and where they were subsequently driven out by the native and dispossessed Irish. The meetinghouse was moved from Moynock to Boveedy, one of six freeholds on the Mercer's estate, about 1650 as it was more central to all four parishes.

According to Kernohan, a John Law(fn2) "*had the tithes of Desertoghill and Errigal in 1658, but was ejected for nonconformity*"(fn1-pg.52) twenty years later. In 1661 Rev. Thomas Boyd had resigned from Aghadowey and went directly to Desertoghill but was ordered to appear at Assize Court for holding a Conventicle(fn3) in the parish..

After the 1641 rebellion Cromwell stipulated in his new charter that Scot's "*settlers were to be discouraged on their Irish estates...*"(fn1, pg.53). Rev. William Gilchrist took over the reins after the 1689 Siege having settled into Kilrea with his wife. Because protection was limited a Regiment of men at Kilrea were no longer able to defend the Bann Valley, Rev. Gilchrist and the Scottish population fled over the mountains of Derry never to return. According to Kernohan, another Minister by the name of McLean had succeeded Gilghrist after the 1689 Derry Siege(fn1-pg. 53). It was not until 1697 that the townland had resources to hire Rev. Matthew Clark/Clerk to oversee the parish for the next thirty years. He extended Boveedy to include the parishes of Kilrea and Tamlagh O'Crilly and also Desertoghill and Errigal. Besides preaching he served as lecturer and administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper throughout the region along with regular meetings of Session where the Elders were enjoined to speak of domestic matters as well. For one thing, there was no roof for the meetinghouse and there was a lack of any stipend. In 1703 Thomas Reid of the Kilrea congregation "*that some of the people have provided...*"(fn1pg.55) but none from Kilrea or Tamlaght.

Those Elders in 1701-06 were listed as follows: "*...names of elders and other members of the congregation-David Morrison, Robert Cochran, John Campbell, John Reid, John Paton, Ninian Pattison, David Gordon, Alex. Hinman, Hugh Young, Daniel Kerr, Geo. Woodburn, John Lilly, Wm. Clark, John Moorhead, James Stranahan, Samuel Reid, James Sterrot, Thomas Reid, Robert Houy, Alex. Wilson, Robt. Wallace, William Shearer, Robert Hill, John Millar, and Robert Hendry. These belong to the period 1701-1706*"(fn1,pg.57).

*"Long as stands good Londonderry,  
With its stories sad and merry,  
Shall thy name be handed down  
As a man of prayer and mark  
Grave and reverend Matthew Clerk."*

It is related that John Scott, a member of Boveedy, enlisted in William's army about 1690, crossed the Boyne and after five or six years deserted. Being pursued to Boveedy, he escaped by the aid of Mr. Clerk<sup>8</sup> and settled in Lismoyle.
