For those of you who don't know her or recall her, she was the foil in most of the Marx Brothers' movies back in the thirties and forties.

John's belief is based on good DNA fact, since so much of my blood relates to them and so far, as far as I know, not to any living Jameson today. I'm finding it difficult to swallow this mostly because I've been researching the Jamesons since 1974. As an open-minded person, knowing I can make mistakes like anyone else, I need to explore this issue to some degree. I've discovered a few Scots in Nutfield who have done actually that in early 1700's. Some Hoggs followed their mother's maiden name, Moore(*Hogg.pdf*), while others changed to Prentiss and Bingley. Alexander Blair who married Elizabeth Cochrane had a son, William, who changed his name to Cochrane and took over the "hereditary estates of Dundonald, Renfrewshire, Scotland and become the 1st Earl of Dundonald and purchased in 1638 from the Wallace family much of the lands that Dundonald and Auchon stood upon" (<u>Cochrane.pdf</u>). Lastly, we have our own native Americans who frequently used their maternal surnames to honor their heritage.

So, reasons vary over the whys, but knowing that history has shown this proves that it has been done. So why not me?






Mary Jemison, daughter of Thomas Jemison & Jane Irwin. Many of us have heard of her story of having been born upon the sea in 1742-3, having journeyed to Marsh Creek, Pennsylvania and then kidnapped in 1758 to be raised up by the Seneca upon the Gardeau Plantation along the banks of the Genesee River in western New York. From all accounts her will to live was resolute: to bring peace among her children, life-long; laboring daily to farm the land she lived on, mostly fruitful; and mainly to find peace amongst the encroaching destiny of the white man. Nearly three hundred years later, her name is synonymous, still, with the land she moved upon and the many descendants that bear her surname. In the end she found her peace and that spirit lives on. # Early Jamesons

**Throughout** the 20<sup>th</sup> century and before this period all research had been done by driving to town halls and to various state and federal institutions that had gathered data through various means. With the advent of personal computers, information has accumulated incredibly quickly accelerating to such an extent that we hardly need to leave the confines of our homes. With this technology I can now develop early trees on our surname without having to travel; a benefit I enjoy providing for those who don't have the time.

**Presented**, are genealogies I've researched from various websites, though primarily from Scotland's People, Proni, and a number of others that contain databases of documents and listings from original archival repositories of which I have cited.

As with any research I provide all responsibility is mine for errors, mistakes and relationships.

### JAMES JAMISOUN OF LINLITHGOW

This family branch has been in this region from an earlier time their origins unknown at present. The family is noted, however by one member whose name is synonymous with "The Sweet Singers" a group of Quakers of a non-conformist type which he later rejected as opportunities arose in the American colonies. Incorporated in this tree is a modified version of an article I wrote long ago and among the changes are some brief lineages I have dug out of the historical archives. One family missing from this list are the Meech/DeWitt branches for which I have no research and have come up against a blank wall.

**1. JAMES**<sup>1</sup> **JAMISOUN**<sup>1</sup> was born about 1599 in Scotland. James Jamisoun<sup>1</sup> lived in Linlithgow, West Lothian, Scotland in 1626<sup>1</sup>.

Possibly had brothers Malcolm, William and Robert Jamisone based on other members of the family having children about the same time as James.

He married (1) Anna Maria **Hardenbrook**, daughter of Abel Hardenbroeck and Annetje Meijnards, on 07 May 1692 in New York, New York, USA<sup>13-14</sup>. She was born about 1667 in New York, New York, USA<sup>15</sup>. She died in 1691 in New York, New York, USA. He married (2) Johanna **Meech** (*See footnote 2*) on 16 Jan 1702/03 in New York, New York, USA<sup>16</sup>.

Notes for David Jamison:

Born in Linlithgow, Scotland in 1659 a son of David Jamisoun and a grandson of James Jamisone, all of Linlithgow. Under a rising star that set him apart from others, David Jamison came into this world in the same year that Charles Stuart II was restored to the throne in 1660. Who would know that a scant 20 years later Jamison would be up against such a formidable foe as the King of Scotland? With the revolution (often called the Civil War or the Reign of Terror and Virtue) at an end religious toleration briefly flared. With Charles' return to the throne, however, Parliament took over financial responsibility of the Kingdom and the end of toleration commenced soon afterwards. In the early 1680s, a great many disassociated themselves with the established Church with religious and political groups existing in defiance of Charles' restricted orthodoxy. Out of the unrest the dissenters and non-conformists became a power unto themselves drawn mainly from the ranks of the middle classes and artisans. The Puritan's influence, since Cromwell, had faded but was no less a factor as were a dozen more groups on the lunatic fringe. This rising confluence of individual interests soon would help spark the Glorious Revolution of 1688 and 1689.

Among the many dissenting affiliations emerged a semi-religious band of non-conformists better known as the "Sweet Singers" or Covenanters. With a college education from Edinburgh and raised from an upper middle class family, David Jamison joined the growing brotherhood of Scots against the Stuarts. In his opposition to Charles, David Jamison, among other leaders of the agitators, was eventually rounded up and cast into the Tollbooth prison in Edinburgh, a dark dreary affair. In 1685, after a short stay, Jamison, banished from Scotland, was released into the hands of Reverend Clarke, the Minister of the fort at New York in the American colonies. Advancing the young man money, David was indentured for a short term which he repaid by teaching Latin soon after his arrival in North America.

In 1660, Jacob **Leisler**(1640-1691) arrived in new Amsterdam. On the outbreak of the Glorious Revolution in 1689, Leisler led the revolt against Lt. Governor, Francis **Nicholson**, who represented the government of James II. On May 1, the citizens of New York City seized the forts and funds of the administration as Leisler declared himself for the Protestant party under the auspices of King William and Queen Mary. He governed for two years at the end of which Jamison became Clerk under the court of Matthew **Clarkson** in 1691 that condemned Jacob Leisler and hung him for treason. Unable to remain aloof of these struggles due to his combative nature, David Jamison made many enemies, some of whose more outspoken remarks found their way into the newspapers.

All the while Jamison studied law. An adherent of Gov. **Fletcher**, he came under the scrutiny of Governor **Bellamont**, Fletcher's successor, who knew of David's involvement in Scotland and the report that he "was condemned to be hanged. for blasphemy and burning of the Bible." Bellamont, named Richard **Coote**(1636-1701) Governor of New York, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire from 1697 to

1701 when he died. A supporter of William, Prince of Orange, Coote received his commission under William and Mary and later was involved in a scandal involving the pirate Captain **Kidd**. Coote brought Jamison under his wing, none-the-less, even though they were on opposite sides, but the relationship was a stormy one and ended when Earl Bellamont died in 1701. It was in 1697 that Jamison was made Freeman, admitted to the Bar<sup>3</sup> on October 6<sup>th</sup> and two years later was Vestry of Trinity Church. His law practice in New York City spanned 17 years from 1719 to 1736<sup>4</sup>.

In 1684, Francis **MacKemie**(1658-1708)<sup>5</sup>, born in County Donegal, Ireland, went to Maryland. As the "Father of American Presbyterianism" he traveled widely to pass the gospel from Virginia to New York. In 1707, the same Queen Anne endorsed the Act of Union which combines England, Scotland, and Wales into Great Britain, Rev. MacKemie was arrested for preaching "without license" in a private house. David Jamison defended him. Arguing the political necessity of toleration in the colonies, David advocated the legal argument that Parliament's Act of Uniformity and Toleration did not apply in America. While MacKemie was acquitted, the Presbyterian ended up serving two months in prison anyway. but Jamison's decision reversed the Uniformity Act marking the end of Protestant persecution in North America. This single instance won him the regard of Lord Cornbury and propelled his career immeasurably.

In 1711, Jamison was appointed Chief Justice of New Jersey by then Governor Robert **Hunter**. In this capacity, the executive functions of New York and New Jersey were combined, and a unified administration of the two regions shared. The following year he was also named Recorder of New York City and commissioned to the post of Attorney-General. When, in 1723, he left this post, his son, William Treat Jamison, succeeded him.

In 1716, in court at Burlington County, Jamison introduced so many pertinent extracts from the old and new Bible that many thought him to be a learned theologian as much as an astute lawyer. In 1723, he was removed from his post in New Jersey where residency was required. In the following 17 years to his death he held the offices in government as in those of his religious faith. Governor Hunter called him, "the greatest man I ever knew!" Through his efforts the Church of England had created many establishments in colonial America. While Gov. Bellamont declared that Jamison was a bigamist, Hunter refuted this, though admitted that "there was a woman by whom he(Jamison) had a child in his wild days."

David Jamison was born 1659 in Linlithgow, Scotland. He died July 26, 1739 in New York City, well known, respected, and admired for his courage, convictions, and dedication to his faith and his ideals. A number of his defenses at the Bar described American legal opinion for decades after, one author notes, his insightful perceptions of law, knowledgeable understandings of religion and politics brought the volatile mix of human nature into line. He remained a permanent resident of New York City despite his purchases in the Minisink and Nine Partners Patent, which were passed down to his two known children. In a petition dated September 18th, 1730, he was named with others as an owner (*deceased*) of a lot in Dutchess county. His estate was probated on 03 Feb 1735 in New York, New York, USA (King Street<sup>17</sup>). Anna Maria Hardenbrook was baptized on 23 Feb 1667 in New York, New York, USA<sup>15</sup>. Based on research I recently conducted it appears his son, William, and his children received the lands in the Minisink up around Cuddeville and Hyde Park. His daughter, Elizabeth, willed her portion of her father's Nine Partner' estate to her son, David **Johnstone**, who built his home there calling it Bellemont (*See maps*).

#### **Property**

In company with William **Nichols**, John **Harrison** and others they obtained a land patent on June 25, 1696 for a tract near the town of present day Harrison in Westchester County. A year later on May 27, 1697 he and eight others<sup>6</sup> purchased and developed a large tract known as "*The Great Nine Partner's Patent*" in

Dutchess County and each of the seven men was provided a share. Mr. Jamison owned Lot 7<sup>8</sup>. This land extended mostly from the Hudson River between Fish Creek and the lands of Myndert Harmense & Company and southerly to the Colony of Connecticut covering the towns of Hyde Park, Clinton, Stanford, Pleasant Valley, Washington and that part of Amenia. Two years later, 1699, nine of the lots were surveyed, but after this not until 1730 did David Jamison called the "owners of rights" together to redivide the patent into 36 principal lots which included nine water lots fronting the Hudson in 1734. Jamison also own land in present day Orange County along Waffingers Creek for 16 miles near Cuddebackville also known as the Minisink<sup>10</sup> which is located where New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania intersect at Tri-States Rock, a point of land between the Neversink River and the Delaware River and known today as Deer Park(See map).

Notes to think about:

A number of researchers list a Jacob Jamison as a son of David Jamison. The name "Jacob" does not appear going back two generations. At least not yet. However, the catch here is that the Johnstone's of New Jersey do list that Christian name and this Jacob Jamison may be of another lineage or another branch among the Jameson families residing in these two colonial cities.

Notes for William Treat Jamison:

In 1723, William Jamison took over the post of Attorney-General in New York City after his father, David Jamison. He signed October 22, 1728 a petition with Richard **Bradley** for a grant of 4000 acres in Ulster

and Orange counties, New York. He was appointed by the State of New York to sue for Letters of Administration in trust for John Johnson, creditor, August 11, 1729, and in February of 1731 he was made a Freeman. His son, John Jamison, who resided in Wawavenda, Orange co., NY, was administrator, September 20, 1768, appointed by James **Thompson** of Goshen, principal creditor bondsman. His son, David, requested David Johnson, merchant, of New York City be appointed his guardian May 30, 1754. It appears his father, William, died some time in that year.

Will of William Jamison made 2d April, 1748, gave his son David Jamison, "if he study Law, all his Law Books, Manuscripts and Precedents, but should he select any other profession, then the Library" was to go to Jamison Johnson, son of Elizabeth Johnson, widow, who was his sister. To his friends, Richard Nicholls, post-master of New York, and to Abm. Kinsman, the testator leaves to each a gold ring; the interest of £400 to his daughter-in-law Mary Campbell<sup>13</sup>. In case she died without issue, the principal was to go to his son, David, who was left residuary legatee, and in case he should die without issue, to John, David, and Jamison Johnson, sons of the abovenamed widow Johnson. He does not mention any additional children, though all known four resided in the Minisink north of the city in Orange County.

#### Property:

While no will includes a complete bequeathing of David Jamison's legacy to his two children it appears that Mr. Jamison got the home on King Street and including some of his own holdings received lands in the Minisink which he proportioned to his own children who farmed the lands in Ulster County or sold them at will.

Dr. John Johnstone, son of Rev. William Johnston and Isabel Maitland of Laverocklaw, Scotland who died at Haddington Abbey, England in 1671, left from Leith, Scotland on September 6<sup>th</sup>, 1685 arriving December of that year in the port of Perth Amboy, New Jersey<sup>17</sup>. 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



Figure 2 Home of Dr. David Johnstone Jr.

Figure 3: Jamisons & Related Families




Figure 4 Nine Partners Patent of 1696




Figure 5 Minisink Patent 1734
